CHICAGO — October programming presented by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra Association (CSOA) at Symphony Center and in other community venues features a wide variety of events, including Chicago Symphony Orchestra (CSO) subscription concerts with Riccardo Muti and other renowned guest conductors and the opening concerts of the 2022/23 Season for the Civic Orchestra of Chicago, as well as CSO at the Movies and the Symphony Center Presents (SCP) Jazz and Chamber Music series. The CSO's contemporary music series, MusicNOW – curated by Mead Composer-in-Residence Jessie Montgomery – opens its 25th season this month, and free chamber music concerts featuring ensembles of CSO musicians begin October 30 at South Shore Cultural Center. Chicago Symphony Orchestra Concerts

Muti Conducts Mozart & Prokofiev (October 1)

On his second subscription program of the new season, Muti leads the CSO in Prokofiev's Fifth Symphony, a landmark work composed in 1944, and Mozart's Symphony No. 39. The program opens with Rossini's Overture to *II viaggio a Reims* (Journey to Reims).

Ticket holders are invited to a free preconcert conversation featuring Daniel Schlosberg in Orchestra Hall. The conversation will begin 75 minutes before the performance which will last approximately 30 minutes.

Muti Conducts Pictures from an Exhibition (October 6-8)

Muti's fall residency concludes with a program that features the CSO in Ravel's orchestration of Mussorgsky's *Pictures from an Exhibition* and Franck's thrilling orchestral tone poem *Le chasseur maudit.* Soloist Eric Lu makes his CSO debut performing Mozart's Piano Concerto No. 27.

Ticket holders are invited to a free preconcert conversation featuring Carl Grapentine in Orchestra Hall. The conversation will begin 75 minutes before the performance and will last approximately 30 minutes.

Chicago Symphony Orchestra Programs with Guest Conductors

Thielemann Conducts Bruckner 8 (October 20-22 & 25)

Renowned German conductor Christian Thielemann returns to the podium at Orchestra Hall for the first time since 1995, leading the Chicago Symphony Orchestra in performances of Bruckner's Symphony No. 8.

Ticket holders are invited to a free preconcert conversation featuring Max Raimi in Orchestra Hall. The conversation will begin 75 minutes before the performance and will last approximately 30 minutes.

On October 20, Class Encounter ticket purchasers can enjoy a preconcert lecture hosted by Chicago's radio DJ, WXRT's Terri Hemmert, with co-host John Hagstrom, CSO Trumpet (Pritzker Military Museum and Library Chair). Tickets for the experience can be purchased after selecting your seats for the concert.

Amadeus Live (October 13-16)

Experience the Academy Award-winning 1984 film on screen while Mozart's celebrated works are performed live by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and Chorus. This riveting film classic tells a story of envy between Vienna court composer Antonio Salieri (F. Murray Abraham) and the raffish but gifted young Mozart (Tom Hulce). The Friday program opens the CSO at the Movies series for the season.

Ticket holders are invited to a free preconcert conversation featuring Tim Munro in Orchestra Hall. The conversation will begin 75 minutes before the performance and will last approximately 30 minutes.

Grieg Piano Concerto & Prokofiev 6 (October 27 & 28)

Conductor Xian Zhang returns to the CSO podium for the first time since 2010 to lead the Orchestra in Prokofiev's Sixth Symphony, as well as the CSO's first performances of the 2020 orchestral work, *Primal Message* by Nokuthula Endo Ngwenyama. Completing the program is Grieg's Piano Concerto with Simon Trpčeski as soloist. The program is repeated October 29 in a concert at the Krannert Center for the Performing Arts on the campus of the University of Illinois-Urbana Champaign and on November 1 at Symphony Center.

Ticket holders are invited to a free preconcert conversation with Daniel Schlosberg in Orchestra Hall. The conversation will begin 75 minutes before the performance and will last approximately 30 minutes.

Civic Orchestra of Chicago

Portraits in Harmony (October 17)

Principal Conductor Ken-David Masur takes the podium for the Civic Orchestra's first concert of the 2022/23 Season in a program of sharply-drawn character portraits, opening with Richard Strauss' whimsical tribute to the medieval prankster, Till Eulenspiegel. The program continues with Jamaican-born British composer Eleanor Alberga's *Tower,* which honors the memory of a dear friend who was a "tower of strength," and concludes with Brahms' Third Symphony, a deeply personal work steeped in vigor, despair and tenderness.

Symphony Center Presents Jazz

Chucho Valdés: The Creation (October 18)

The great Cuban pianist and composer Chucho Valdés opens the SCP Jazz series with his four-movement suite *La Creación* (The Creation) for Afro-Cuban band and vocals. The SCP Jazz co-commission unites elements including Afro-Cuban religion, African music, and blues, along with influences from legendary trumpeter Miles Davis' iconic album *Bitches Brew.*

Immediately following the performance, members of the <u>CSO Latino Alliance</u> will host a post-concert fiesta to celebrate Chucho's 81st birthday. Symphony Center Presents Chamber Music

Midori and Jean-Yves Thibaudet (October 23)

The SCP Chamber Music series opens with master violinist and educator Midori who has been a force in classical music for almost 40 years. This season she collaborates with Jean-Yves Thibaudet on three Beethoven sonatas. Anchoring the recital is *Kreutzer*, one of Beethoven's most famous works. The program also includes the Violin Sonata in A Major and the Violin Sonata in E-flat Major.

CSO MusicNOW

Perspectives (October 24)

The CSO MusicNOW series marks its 25th season in 2022/23 and launches with a program that features works of award-winning Black American composers: Alvin Singleton, Carlos Simon and CSO Mead Composer-in-Residence Jessie Montgomery. The concert includes Singleton's *Jasper Drag*, a trio for clarinet, piano and violin composed in 2000, and his work *Be Natural*, written for a combination of three string instruments. Three works by Simon are featured on the program, including *Lickety Split*, a duo for piano and cello written in 2015; *loop*, a 2021 string trio created in response to a seemingly never-ending pandemic loop, and a 2020 string quartet, *Warmth from Other Suns.* The program concludes with *Sergeant McCauley*, a work scored for wind quintet and string quartet by Mead Composer-in-Residence Jessie Montgomery that is inspired by the Great Migration and specifically tracks the journey of Montgomery's

great-grandfather, a buffalo soldier who migrated northward before returning south to Mississippi.

CSO Chamber Music

Chicago Pro Musica at South Shore Cultural Center (October 30)

The 2022/23 Season of chamber music programs featuring ensembles of CSO musicians begins with a program at the South Shore Cultural Center (7059 South Shore Dr., Chicago). The program features violinist Diane Mues, Assistant Principal Clarinet John Bruce Yeh, Principal Horn David Cooper and pianist Patrick Godon performing Mozart's Trio for Clarinet, Viola & Piano in E-flat Major, Schumann's *Märchenerzählungen* and Reinecke's Trio for Piano, Clarinet and Horn in B-flat Major.

The second CSO Chamber Music concert in the series will be presented Sunday, November 13, at 3:00 p.m. at Northeastern Illinois University.

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Chicago Symphony Orchestra: cso.org

Founded by Theodore Thomas in 1891, the Chicago Symphony Orchestra is consistently hailed as one of

the greatest orchestras in the world. Since 2010, the pre-eminent conductor Riccardo Muti has served as its 10th music director. Jessie Montgomery is Mead Composer-in-Residence, and Hilary Hahn is CSO Artist-in-Residence.

From baroque through contemporary music, the CSO commands a vast repertoire. Its renowned musicians annually perform more than 150 concerts, most at Symphony Center in Chicago and, each summer, at the suburban Ravinia Festival. They regularly tour nationally and internationally. Since 1892, the CSO has made 62 international tours, performing in 29 countries on five continents.

People around the globe listen to weekly radio broadcasts of CSO concerts and recordings on the WFMT radio network and online at <u>cso.org/radio</u>. Recordings by the CSO have earned 63 Grammy Awards, including two in 2011 for Muti's recording with the CSO and Chorus of Verdi's *Messa da Requiem* (Muti's first of eleven releases with the CSO to date).
