FALL IN LOVE WITH MUSIC A ROUSING SUCCESS

The 15th anniversary of “Fall in Love with Music” was held on Friday, October 17, in Presidents Hall of the Union League Club of Chicago. Guests were welcomed by League President Sarah Good, who also shared a brief history of the event. Sarah acknowledged those League members who collaborated on the very first “Fall in Love with Music” in 2010 – Bridgette Hayes who conceptualized the idea, Cheryl Istvan as League President, and Linda Neumann as Co-Chair. Guests were then served a lovely lunch of lemon herb chicken.

After lunch, Sharon Mitchell, VP of Fundraising, introduced event co-chairs Margo Oberman and Mimi Duginger. Margo subsequently introduced Antoine Tamestit to the stage and shared that Antoine is one of only a few full-time viola soloists in the world. Notably, he plays the first viola made in 1672 by Stradivari, which Antoine lovingly calls “Gustav Mahler.”

Jeff Alexander, President of the CSOA, interviewed Antoine who spoke about his musical background and his life as a viola artist. Antoine then performed music by Bach. We were surprised and thrilled when Antoine invited his fiancé violinist Alexandra Preuciil to join him on

the stage. They performed a lively duet by Bartok. When Antoine heard that the theme of our event was “Fall in Love with Music”, he decided that a duet performed with his fiancé would be a great addition to our program. Their performance was delightful and thrilling!

Mimi then introduced both Klaus Mäkelä, Zell Music Director Designate for the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, and Jeff Alexander, President of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra Association, to the stage for a panel discussion. Guests were able to learn so much about Klaus from his early music education to his current experiences as an in-demand international conductor. Of course, we were all thrilled to hear how much he enjoys working with our much-loved Chicago Symphony Orchestra.

Mimi ended the program by thanking everyone who helped make “Fall in Love with Music” such a huge success,

highlighting our Maestro Sponsors: Pamela and Cushman Andrews, Lori Julian and the Julian Family Foundation, Liz Stiffel, and Helen Zell.

“Fall in Love with Music” 2025 was a huge success, both in our attendance and our financial goals. Total attendance at the event was 180. This was the highest total revenue and the largest number of sponsorships in the history of the event. AIM CONCERTS AN OUTSTANDING SUCCESS

“Amazing!” “I can’t get the music out of my head!” “How did Jeremy Li play all of those notes?” “I loved it!” “I want to play all of the instruments.” “Astonishing!” “Wow! I’ve never seen such a beautiful place!”

Those are just some of the comments we heard after the AIM concerts on Nov. 12th and 13th. The welcome that the League volunteers provided set the stage for four extraordinary days of concerts that saw more than 14,000 people at these amazing concerts.

Maestro Thomas Wilkins, as always, energized the crowd – and musicians – with the messages of Courage, Caution, and Kindness woven through the music in Wednesday and Thursday concerts. The final piece, the Can Can from Offenbach’s *Orpheus in the Underworld*, had everyone clapping and bouncing in the seats.

On Friday and Saturday, Maestro Andrew Grams and American singer-songwriter of children’s music, Justin Roberts, enthralled the audience with the concerts, “Which Instrument Should I Play?”. The audience, children and adults were captivated by the exploration of the sound of individual instruments and how they all work together to create thrilling music.

More than 1,100 people attended the Instrument Petting Zoo, and we ran out of supplies for some of the incredible activities because the Family Concerts are becoming so popular. The energy in the Rotunda was powerful! The children love dressing up as Mini Maestros and conducting an ensemble from the Civic Orchestra. Parents and children also enjoyed the Be a Composer activity where children could put notes on a musical scale and then a Civic Orchestra member played the tune. The scavenger hunt and the instrument puzzles kept families busy.

The Civic then ended its day at Fourth Presbyterian Church to play Bach for a very appreciative audience. This year's marathon featured four of the Bach Brandenburg concertos and a selection of Bach's shorter pieces. The concert ended with a rousing sing-along to several of Bach's hymns.

SOMEONE YOU SHOULD KNOW

JOHN BRUCE YEH

ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL CLARINET AND E FLAT CLARINET



Did you know that John Bruce Yeh won the “Frank Sinatra Musical Performance Award” when he was 19 years-old, and “Old Blue Eyes”—ie, Frank Sinatra---presented him with the award. However, John wasn’t always destined to be a musician. Both his parents were scientists, and it was always assumed John would also go into a scientific profession, but that wasn’t to be. John explained, “My mother had taken piano lessons so we had a piano at our house. I started taking piano lessons when I was six, but it just wasn’t for me. Then in second grade, we were offered orchestra instruments, and the clarinet picked me.” He stopped piano lessons. “I now regret not continuing with piano lessons as it is a good basis for all music lessons. I’m delighted that my daughter still plays piano while my wife and I play the clarinet.”

John credits his first clarinet teacher, Mr. Herritt, with giving him a great musical foundation, and then continued lessons with a more advanced teacher, Mr.

Gray, who could take his skills to the next level. “He was my mentor from grade school to my two years at UCLA. He also lived two minutes from my house. He was an amazing teacher and shepherded me in the right way to become a professional musician,” John explained. He entered UCLA at 15 as a premed major, but he felt the pull of music. “I realized music was my passion, and to my parents’ credit, they agreed. They said as long as you do your best, we will support you. That advice has stayed with me and has influenced how I have raised my daughters,” John proudly said. He then transferred to the Juilliard School of Music, and later began auditioning with the Los Angeles Philharmonic, Cincinnati Symphony, and the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra for orchestral positions. “The conductor at St. Paul was someone I had worked with. He felt I would be held back with a chamber orchestra so I didn’t win. The following month I auditioned with the CSO and won! Maestro Georg Solti recognized my talent and became my mentor,” he explained.

John smiled as he said how Solti skyrocketed the CSO to international fame and each year encouraged the orchestra to be better. “He would say I conducted the New York Phil and they are good, but we are better. The next year he would say, I conducted the Boston Symphony. They are good, but we are better. The following year after conducting the Berlin Philharmonic,

he said, they are good but we must be better!” John was 19 when he won his audition and dropped out of Juilliard. Later he enrolled in Northwestern University School of Music who enabled him to finish his college degree at Juilliard.

When asked about the different conductors he has worked with, John explained that Solti was driven and insisted on high standards. Carlo Maria Giulini was worshipful of the music and beloved by the musicians. Daniel Barenboim brought a softer edge and gentleness to counter Solti’s precision. Pierre Boulez brought his ability to dissect complex music to the orchestra while Bernard Haitink raised the standard of the orchestra by insisting on precise intonation. Riccardo Muti brought the fire of Solti and the absolute precision of Haitink but in an Italianate way. “Muti brought us Verdi’s operas which we had never played. He lavished his experience with Verdi and this added immeasurably to the orchestra. Muti also opened the orchestra to everyone by starting the free concerts in Millennium Park and the neighborhoods and then opening the rehearsals to patrons, seniors, and veterans. He was overwhelmed by the outpouring of love by Chicagoans at that first Millennium Park concert. Now Klaus Makela is putting his stamp on the orchestra. We are all looking forward to what is to come,” John explained.

John’s love of new music started at UCLA and continued at Juilliard where he met new music composers. When he came to Chicago, he played Boulez’s music and met Howard Sandoff who introduced John to more contemporary music. In 1979, he formed the Chicago Pro Music so he could play more new music. He has also worked with Pierre Boulez and Elliot Carter on new music for the clarinet. He continues his love of new music and chamber music by playing with chamber music groups and playing at numerous music festivals.

When asked what he does for fun, John laughing said, “I play chamber music with my wife, walk my dog, do Pilates to stay healthy, and cook food. I love all kinds of food and will cook whatever is in the fridge. My daughter Molly has picked up my love of food and has the program *Girl Meets Farm* on the Food Network. But even more, I love playing with my three granddaughters.”

John brings his love of life, music, and people to all he does. In his 48 years with the symphony, he has enriched the orchestra with his exceptional talent, but more importantly, he is looking forward to what is to come and what he can give to the his beloved CSO. This year, John is the League’s musician engagement liaison. John Bruce Yeh is someone you should know.

For many years, the League has funded, through our Tribute Fund, a stipend for a fellow in the Civic Orchestra. Our annual contribution for this purpose is \$10,000. While contributions to this fund are voluntary, we would like for you to keep this fund in mind and help it grow. Some of you have kindly made memorial donations. Donations are also a nice way to thank or honor someone for any reason. Of course, un-designated donations are completely welcome. LEAGUE ANNUAL FUND

The League Annual Fund is one of our biggest fundraising tools. Unlike our other fundraisers, it doesn't include any entertainment or food; it just requires your generosity. Our annual goal is \$100,000, and at the end of the fiscal year the entire Annual Fund content is transferred to the CSOA's general fund, to be used as needed.
