CHICAGO — The Chicago Symphony Orchestra Association (CSOA) announces the return of its signature student engagement events for the 2025/26 Season at Symphony Center, supporting the next generation of classical music lovers.

Highlights of the season include two CSO College Night events and the second Teen Night, specifically curated to connect young people with the orchestra. Hosted by the CSO Student Ambassadors — students passionate about orchestral music — these nights offer exclusive concert tickets and unique pre-performance experiences, such as musician Q&As, social hours and complimentary refreshments.

Chicago Symphony Orchestra College Nights

CSO Student Ambassadors host two College Night programs in the 2025/26 Season, which include pizza, cookies and soft drinks. During College Nights, students enjoy specially priced tickets to a CSO subscription concert as well as a preconcert Q&A session with a CSO musician hosted by a CSO Student Ambassador. Dinner begins at approximately 5:30 p.m. with the Q&A beginning at 6:30 p.m. in Buntrock Hall at Symphony Center.

Chen Leads The Four Seasons (November 13)

Warbling birds, trickling streams, summer storms, barking dogs, icy landscapes — Vivaldi pioneered the art of painting nature through music with his blazingly original *Four Seasons*. Concertmaster Robert Chen takes on these seminal concertos and leads

Mahler's orchestral rendering of Beethoven's *Serioso* Quartet and Mozart's exquisitely crafted Divertimento in B-flat Major.

Songs of Love and Farewell (April 11)

Why are we here, and what comes next? Throughout time, humans have wrestled with these questions, resulting in compositions like Richard Strauss' radiant swan song, Rachmaninov's haunting depiction of the journey of souls to the afterlife, Janáček's portrait of hope and solidarity in a Siberian prison camp and Wagner's spine-tingling meditation on eternal love.

Civic Orchestra of Chicago Teen Night

Teen Night tickets become available two weeks before the date of the event and cost \$5 for teens and any accompanying adults or children. A ticket is required to access the evening's event and concert. No separate ticket or RSVP is required for the Teen Night preconcert event.

The CSOA recommends people ages 13-19 attend Teen Night. Stay tuned for more information about alternative places for accompanying adults and children to gather during the Teen Night preconcert event. CSOA staff members, a Symphony Center House Manager and ushers will manage and supervise the event.

Civic Plays Price & Dvořák (March 2)

Ken-David Masur leads the Civic Orchestra in works by three titans of Black excellence in American music, starting with gems by George Walker and Ulysses Kay. Florence Price's *Ethiopia's Shadow in America* portrays an enslaved man's spiritual journey from the time of his arrival on this continent. Antonin Dvořák, a vital early champion of American music, imbues his lyrical and exuberant Seventh Symphony with admiration and hope for his own native Czech Republic.

2025/26 Student Tickets

Symphony Center welcomes students with specially priced tickets for select concerts, including CSO Classical, CSO Chamber Music, Symphony Center Presents concerts and more.

Chicago Symphony Orchestra: cso.org

Founded by Theodore Thomas in 1891, the Chicago Symphony Orchestra is consistently hailed as one of the world's great orchestras. In April 2024, Klaus Mäkelä was named the Orchestra's 11th music director, and he will begin an initial five-year tenure as Zell Music Director with the 2027/28 Season. Riccardo Muti, the Orchestra's 10th music director from 2010 until 2023, became Music Director Emeritus for Life at the beginning of the 2023/24 Season. Joyce DiDonato is the CSO Artist-in-Residence for the 2025/26 Season.

The CSO commands a vast repertoire, from baroque through contemporary music. Its renowned musicians perform more than 150 concerts annually, in Orchestra Hall at Symphony Center in downtown Chicago and each summer at the Ravinia Festival in suburban Highland Park. The ensemble regularly tours domestically, and since 1892, has made 65 international tours, performing in 30 countries on five continents.

Patrons around the globe enjoy weekly radio broadcasts of CSO concerts and recordings via the WFMT Radio Network and online at cso.org/radio. Launched in 2007, CSO Resound is the ensemble's Grammy Award-winning independent record label, featuring live performances with world-class conductors and guest artists. Since 1916, the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and Chorus have amassed an extensive discography that has earned 65 Grammy awards from the Recording Academy.

The CSO is part of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra Association (CSOA), which also includes the Chicago Symphony Chorus, Civic Orchestra of Chicago, Symphony Center Presents and Negaunee Music Institute. The Chicago Symphony Chorus, founded by Margaret Hillis in 1957, is the country's largest professional chorus. Donald Palumbo is the Director of the Chicago Symphony Chorus. Founded by second music director Frederick Stock during the 1919/20 Season, the Civic Orchestra of Chicago is a training ensemble for emerging professionals with Ken-David Masur serving as its principal conductor. Symphony Center Presents features guest artists and ensembles across an expansive array of genres, including classical, jazz, world and contemporary. The Negaunee Music Institute offers community and educational programs that annually engage more than 200,000 people of diverse ages and backgrounds throughout the Chicagoland area.

Through the Institute and numerous other activities — including annual free community concerts in Chicago neighborhoods — the CSO is committed to using the power of music to strengthen bonds with its longtime patrons and create connections with new audiences.
